HOW TO GET TO THE BALMORAL BOWLS CLUB

For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is Map 160, Reference Q12 (see below).

<u>From the Gateway Arterial</u>--turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Colmslie RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.


<u>From the City--</u>go across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Colmslie RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the west (old Cleveland Road</u>--Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right. Jean Howie Drive goes through the park (the entrance to the drive is near the boundary of the Bulimba Cemetery). Go about 350 metres along the Drive and turn right into the Bowls Club car park.

FEBRUARY 2001 MEETING

About 30 members and supporters turned up for our first night at our new venue, Balmoral Bowls Club. The facilities proved generally successful, with the club president, Don McDonald, manning the bar and greeting us with good Scots hospitality.

Maurie DeHayr began the introductions. There were apologies from Bob Payne, who had had an unexpected visit from an old army friend from Britain. Doug Thoresen was reported to be on his way, although he would be a bit late. One of our guests was Greg Gordon, President of the Australian Pipe Band Association, who was visiting Brisbane to upgrade the local pipe band registry system.

First piper to play was Phillip Cowan. Playing a big sounding pipe he gave us a selection of mainly 'traditional' type tunes. They included *Caber Feidh, Rose of Alandale, Hector the Hero, The Ballochyle Gathering, Ellenorr, The Lochaber Gathering, Blair Drummond, Pretty Marion, Trinity Bay Blue, Cork Hill, The Death of a Space Piper and part of Crossing the Minch.* As we are by now used to hearing, a quite impressive performance.

Next to play was James Sagar, a pupil of Maurie De Hayr. On a very steadily blown pipe with good balance and volume, he showed what can be done with a couple of simple tunes played with good musical sense--*Green Hills of Tyrol, Arthur Bignold of Lochrosque, Leaving Ireland*. His bass drone showed a it of roughness as he went on, but not enough to be seriously disturbing.

To continue the evening, Matthew Supranowicz stepped up and launched straight into his first tune. His pipe was a bit quieter than those heard previously but was well and steadily blown, continuing the excellent standard of instrument heard so far. His tunes included *Ellenorr*, *Duncan McGillivray*, *McNeill of Ugadale*, *The Royal Scottish Pipers Society* and *Caber Feidh* (Strathspey).

Nathan Bedford was the next player, again on a strong sounding and well blown pipe. His tunes included Scots Wa' Hae, A Man's a Man, Music of Spey, Gardens of Skye, Molly Connell, Fiddler's Joy, Piper of Drummond, High Road to Linton, Jock Wilson's Ball, Colin's Cattle, Highland Laddie and Barren Rocks of Aden.

Robert Baker was the next for us to hear. Unfortunately his drones were a little out from the beginning, but he gave us a pleasant and very varied set of music, including the 3/4s *Mary Campbell, Balmoral, JK Cairns*, the 6/8s *Dear Old Donegal, St Patrick's Day*, various other band tunes and *Paddy's Green Shamrock Shoes, The Brolum* and *Humours of Tulla*. Part way through his performance, Doug Thoresen corrected the drone tuning problem. Once again Robert showed the steady improvement we have heard from each performance he has given at the Society.

Hugh Maclean had also come prepared with his pipes and after a short tune up they were sounding good and he launched into some slow airs including *The Ocean's Cycle, The Boatman* and *The Sound of Mull* followed by a rousing rendition of Ron Fleming's tune, *Bengullion*. He then went on to the 2/4 March *Lorna Campbell of Feorlin*, strathspey *Monymusk* and the Reel *Smith of Chilliechassie*, finishing up with the march *Calum's Road*. Maurie DeHayr had also brought his pipes and on a quieter but resonant instrument gave us a good range of tunes. The first one, *Leaving Eriskay* was played at the Edinburgh Tattoo some years ago but called something else! He then gave us some 9/8s: *Battle of the Somme* and *The Heights of Dargai* and some 4/4s: *Bonnie Gallowa, The Auld Hoose* and *Loch Ruan*. He pointed out the absolute regularity of this last tune. Next were a couple of 6/8s, *P/M Sam Scott* and *Leaving Port Askaig*. Finally he played the ground of *Macleod of Rassay's Salute*.

Continuing the piping, although by now it was 10.00pm, was Iain Bruce. Another quiet but resonant instrument, starting out with some slower tunes. His ground was of *The Prince's Salute*, written in 1715 for the Old Pretender (James 3rd of England and 8th of Scotland) This interpretation of this

tune split the Piobaireachd Society in the early art of the 20th century.

Doug Thoresen next had a couple of tunes including *The Rose of Kelvingrove* on a very bright sounding pipe. He related that the tune *The Rose of Kelvingrove* had been played at the amalgamation of the regiments which formed the Highlanders This included including the Gordons so he had played it in honour of honour of our guest, Greg Gordon.

Matthew Rigby was the last player. As usual, he had a nice big resonant bagpipe. His tunes included the 6/8 *Macleod of Mull*, a Slow Air and some Jigs and Hornpipes

Finally, we had the drawing of the raffle (by Greg Gordon). It was won by Iain Bruce, and all drifted into supper. Thanks to all the pipers who gave us such an enjoyable evening of playing. As you can see from the above, we had a lot of piping - the playing didn't finish until 10.45 pm!

From Dave Sinclair to the Society

Just a few suggestions with a view to encouraging the playing of Ceol Mor on a regular basis at Society Meetings. The are 42 Salutes in Piobaireachd Society Books (Book 1-1, Book 2-0, Book 3-1, Book 4-1, Book 5-2, Book 6-1, Book 7-1, Book 8-4, Book 9-3, Book 10-5, Book 11-7, Book 12-3, Book 13-2, Book 14-4, Book 15-7).

How about taking the Piobaireachd Society books from 1-15 and examining the Grounds of all the Salutes with the aim of presenting say six different Salute grounds every evening throughout the year?

This should not be very time consuming as most grounds take only three minutes or so to play.

Volunteers would be encouraged to select a tune and come along to the next meeting prepared to play

it. Playing from the music sheet would be acceptable.

There would be no competition as I think this music should be played for the pleasure of all with no pressure whatsoever on the musician.

Copies of the tunes for each meeting could be distributed to members of the audience who may thus be inspired to try over these tunes at home if they have not had the incentive before.

Tape recording would be permitted to facilitate this?

I am sure that the practice of playing a tune in its entirety discourages and actually bores those in the audience who cannot appreciate the variations, especially in tunes where the setting may be at fault, and if the audience as a whole have seldom heard Ceol Mor.

If the idea appeals then I think we could in time study alternative settings of the Grounds, if available, such as Barrie Orme's Simon Fraser and George Moss etc.

This would be something we could develop on the Internet in conjunction with other Societies world wide.

I submit these ideas as a listener rather than a critic.

PS Having worked on the Salutes and hopefully stimulated interest, I think the next field for investigation should be the Gatherings. The main thing of which we should not lose sight is the preservation of Highland music and if Ceol Mor is not presented in an attractive way then it will surely vanish in Brisbane anyway. The tunes which accompany this article (Struan Robertson's Salute, The Prince's Salute, Corrienessan's Salute, MacLeod of Raasay's Salute, Salute to Donald, The Munro's Salute) were not chosen in preference to any others. It is my intention to produce six tunes every month until we have gone over the 42 tunes and any other Salutes that may turn up. The object is to share and promote the tunes in the company of players and non players or past players alike.

<u>Piper & Drummer Online</u> (www.PiperAndDrummer.com), internet magazine of the Ontario piping community has announced an exclusive, breakthrough series by Dr. William Donaldson of Aberdeen, Scotland, on the Set Tunes for the major solo piping competitions at the Northern Meeting at Inverness and the Argyllshire Gathering at Oban.

18 Tunes: an exploration of Piobaireachd will run as a series in the Features section of Piper & Drummer online over the next three months. Visitors to the site will be able to download Donaldson's exhaustive research into manuscripts and collections only recently made available by the university libraries of Aberdeen and Glasgow, the Mitchell Library in Glasgow and the National Library in Edinburgh.

The series shows examples of the piobaireachd heritage that may surprise many. Players in the last century clamoured, largely in vain, for the old sources to be published. Dr. William Donaldson has transcribed key examples of manuscript sources for electronic media so that for the first time in more than a century players can

consider a tune with direct access to the leading stylistic features of the master players and editors in the tradition. The series marks a new departure in piobaireachd and in piping as a whole. A number of things will happen for the first time: texts based on the old manuscripts and printed collections are being posted to the net in electronically transcribed versions prepared by a leading writer on the subject with accompanying notes and comments, extensive extracts from the most important sources are brought together for each tune on the 2001 Senior and Gold Medal lists in a way impossible with traditional print media because of the expense of printing and music typesetting. For the first time, the modern player can easily access the leading stylistic features of many of the most important masters when considering a tune, or preparing it for competition.

Dr. William Donaldson is best known for his book, The Highland Pipe and Scottish Society, 1750-1950 (Tuckwell Press, East Linton, 2000). This thorough history of the evolution of piobaireachd to what we it is today is one of the most important academic works ever on the Highland bagpipe. Donaldson was taught piobaireachd for many years by Robert Brown and Robert Nichol, the famous "Bobs of Balmoral."
